




Henk Beerten Netherlands


Henk Beerten continued

I had a fantastic time at Camp Carson. After a couple of days of adjusting, getting over my uneasiness of speaking English, I felt accepted by the counselors. The open mentality, friendliness, comradeship, everything helped me to feel comfortable.

Working with the children was wonderful. Being a teacher the work was not to difficult, but what I found so inspiring that we managed to teach children how to swim in one week, how to overcome fear in climbing the big tree, daring to ride the donkeys Sears and Robuck. All wonderful experiences that gave the children confidence in themselves and in each other. A fantastic experience for all of us.

It was great when I came back in 2012 and I felt the same vibe was still there, after 40 years. The commitment of the counselors, the children. Very optimistic in every sense of the word. I think Camp Carson is a fantastic place for children to spend the summer. I find it special to see the international perspective with which you work. All those flags in the mess hall are a symbol of this. It is very important that children learn that all over the world children and adult are more the same than that they are different. We have skills, expectations, fears and aspirations that we share. At Camp Carson you can learn this from each other. An experience that will last a lifetime.



Two years ago my brother Andre was cycling in the US and was passing by Princeton. I told him all about Camp Carson, of course, and he paid a visit. He was as impressed as I am about the positive atmosphere.

I intend to visit Camp Carson again sometime in the future, because there was one thing I missed in the mess hall. That's the Dutch flag. I will bring one with me and hope to put it with all the others.

One thing I am absolutely sure of is that I would not be able to do this job without the fantastic team at Camp Carson. Those strangers that I met on that first day were my friends by the second. The support and friendship that everyone at camp offers keeps me going throughout the summer and it's something I can't wait to come back to. They always told us that part of the camp magic was being able to make these friendships. I feel closer to some of my camp friends than I do with people I've known my whole life. Sharing these moments and weeks with the other counselors makes you a better team and better friends. I can't wait to see everyone again. They've become a second family to me.



I didn't think camp would affect me when I went and it's something I am thankful for. To anyone who is thinking about working at a summer camp (or has children who are) but is worried an internship would be more beneficial, you can forget about that. That was my initial thought but I underestimated the skills and experience I could gain from working as a counselor. It gave me the confidence to walk into a room and feel that I could be friends with everyone in there. Personally, I gained so many soft skills from my time with the kids. Camp is the main thing I talk about in any interview I do because I can show them my best self and what I can do when I love where I am. On another level, camp provided me with the opportunity to forget about university and just be myself again which is something I would struggle to put a value on.

Every week we see these kids grow in confidence and abilities by being around camp and it happens in different ways for each of the kids. Some of them start off quiet and at the end of the week will be the most talkative person I have ever met, others just like to tell me what they've accomplished in their week. It is always a great part of my job talking with the kids about what they have and want to do that week or later in life. I try my best to be the best role model for these kids and help them grow. I love seeing these kids try, more than anything else that is all I can ask from them. Even sometimes if they don't reach their goal I can always see them grow on the inside. Something inside them seems to register – I tried my best and that's what I need to do next time. We do our best to help them recognize that no matter what they've done, there is always something to be proud of.

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

Spencer spent many summers at camp as a camper and staff member and is thrilled to bring back this camp icon.




This suspension bridge rendering will span the gully between the Ridge Top cabins and the main part of camp.

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
