

CAMP CARSON'S 75TH ANNIVERSARY by Bill Carson

With the purchase of the former Lake Seminole recreation site by Mr. and Mrs. William A. Carson in 1940 and their donation of the property to the Evansville Y.M.C.A., 1940 marked Camp Carson's first season. Prior to that, the Y had operated a four acre camping site on the Green River. Current camp board member, Leonard Schlamp, was among the campers attending Camp Carson that first year and still has the imprinted pencil the Y gave to registering campers.

Mr. Carson was a member of the Y.M.C.A. board for more than 40 years and was president for seven years during the depression. He first came to Evansville as the general manager of the interurban traction company in the early part of the 20th century. At the time, there was no bridge on the Ohio River connecting Evansville and Henderson and Mr. Carson and others devised a system to load the trolley cars on barges so they could be "sailed" between Indiana and Kentucky.



Mr. Carson's formal education ended with graduation from high school; he was heard to remark more

than once that he thought he might have made something of himself had he been able to attend college. Most people would find that somewhat amusing, as he enjoyed considerable success in a number of business ventures in Evansville, ranging from the traction company, to operating a furniture factory, manufacturing the first Coldspot refrigerators and freezers for Sears, Roebuck and Company and, finally, serving as president and chairman of the board of Old National Bank, his banking career originating when he was in his mid-60's. He also served a term as president of the prestigious National Association of Manufacturers.

W.A. or Will, as he was known to many, had a long-standing interest in the development of young people demonstrated by his lengthy involvement with the Y.M.C.A. and his philanthropy to Evansville College, as a member of the board of trustees and donor of student scholarships and lead gift towards the construction of the Carson Center on campus.

W.A.'s interest in Camp Carson was perpetuated by his son, Ellis, and Bob Becker, husband of W.A.'s grandchild, Betsy, who also served as president of the Evansville Y.M.C.A. As Ellis Carson remarked in 1962 on the occasion of the purchase of an additional 70 acres for Camp Carson by Mr. and Mrs. William Carson, "Whatever is done for the Y.M.C.A. has become a matter of family pride."

The Carson family's involvement was renewed when Bill Carson, W.A.'s namesake and grandson, moved from Memphis to Indianapolis in late 2005. Bill was a camper and counselor while living in Evansville and expressed an interest in getting reconnected with Camp Carson. Shortly afterwards, Bill was invited to join the camp board. Upon joining the board, the executive director of Camp Carson, Mark Scoular, asked Bill what he thought were priorities for camp. Without hesitation, Bill responded that the original cabins, which dated to the founding of camp, had outlived their useful life and Bill hoped that replacement of the cabins could happen in the relatively near future. Remarkably, the replacement of all of the cabins has been accomplished and 2014 will mark the initial camping season for 12 brand new, modern cabins.

The involvement of the fourth generation of Carson family at Camp Carson was marked by the donation of one of the first four new cabins by W.A.'s great-grandson, Courtney W. Carson, and Courtney's sponsoring of approximately 30 campers in the Operation Military Family



Camp in summer 2013. Courtney also has pledged to fund the renovation of the camp infirmary or construction of a new facility to replace it. The fifth generation is represented by attendance at camp by great-great-grandchildren Carson and Annie Greene Becker.

As Camp Carson celebrates its 75th anniversary, its future is secured and the Carson family's relationship with camp continues "as a matter of family pride," from Mr. and Mrs. William Carson through each succeeding generation.

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
